The tours included sharings by teachers of different subjects, such as Chinese, English and Maths, on how teachers make their subject topics interesting and engaging for students. For example, some Chinese passages selected for the DSE curriculum were turned into song form by our alumnus, Ken Wan, to help us memorise the passages. Guests were also offered tea made by our schoolmates who enrolled in a tea ceremony course, showing how the school offered us opportunities to further our awareness of culture which helps our understanding of language, not just forcing through rote memorisation. Parents not only visited the newly renovated library and chapel, but were also shown a variety of school extracurricular activities, with a range of activities as diverse as from Chinese debate to rock-climbing. They even watched "Curse of the Church Bell", a spectacular mini-drama performance by the English Drama Team!

While the guided tour was oriented towards parents, the school also provided plenty of game booths for visiting kids. The STEM Society, Boy Scouts, Gardening Society and more poured their effort into designing fun activities for kids. For instance, the STEM Society had booths like Robomaster, where kids controlled a robot to shoot projectiles at targets, and tattoo printing, which lets kids use a machine to print a temporary tattoo on their arm. They showcase the school's STEM achievements as much as they entertain children. Moreover, there was even an area where children could have a go at skateboarding, and they were taught some basic skills and tricks. Not to mention they had a chance to make bouquets and bracelets with dried flowers at the Gardening Society's booth. After playing 8 game booths, kids could choose from a selection of souvenirs, such as stationeries, tote bags, and magnets, all of which were designed by our artistic schoolmates and teachers, who put elements of our school into the designs.

This year's Open Day was successful beyond our expectations. We managed to create a captivating, informative and memorable experience for both parents and kids despite the many restrictions under the Covid pandemic.
